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1 Objectives of the MIDIR Final Event

The MIDIR Final Event took place in Rome the 15th July, 2008. It presented the main results of the MIDIR project and showed that the innovative MIDIR methodology can be applied to any risk scenario, cultural environment, community and country. The main objective was to inspire participants to apply and use the MIDIR Approach. The conference brought together an audience from Public Administrations across Europe together with experts and academics in the field of governance.

4 Working groups session

During the event a session with working groups was organised. The MIDIR team showed, practically, the application of methodology to any risk scenario, cultural environment, community and country.

The goal of the session was that participants experience the power of collaboration in developing systemic resilience using the MIDIR Methodology.

Participants were asked to write risks they would like to discuss on a card. On the basis of these, the following "risk clusters" were selected:

Individual Health Risks/Threats, with the sub-topics of:

- Pandemic
- Additives in food, e.g. vitamins
- Risk of surgery
- Nano-Materials reactions within the human body

Waste Pollution, with the sub-topics of:

- Missing recycling policies
- Health effects

Natural Hazards, with the sub-topics of:

- Floods
- Mountain Risk

Climate Change & Energy, with the sub-topics of:

- CO₂ control
- Atomic Energy

Electromagnetic waste, with the sub-topics of:

Wi-fi

Quality of information in Internet

Each participant received a questionnaire and a table with the MIDIR Key-Performance Indicators. The groups discussed and replied to the following questions:

- 1) What is the situation today that demands a resilience approach?
- 2) What is the goal?
- 3) What dependencies on other organisations or systems make the situation more complex?
- 4) Review the relevance and meaning of the 12 MIDIR indicators in your risk context.
- 5) Discuss how the MIDIR approach could be used in different and interdependent risk contexts.
- 6) What would be the benefits of the MIDIR approach in your chosen risk context?
- 7) Please be ready for one person from each group to report back answers 5 and 6 to all attendees.











The results or each group were reported to all participants. Examples are:





The main conclusion by the various groups was that the application of the MIDIR Approach would be useful for the governance of the specific risk. On the other hand the MIDIR partners learnt that "team is more important than the idea".

5 Round Table: The effective impact of Risk Governance in decision making

A Round Table discussion between decision-makers (Public Administration), experts in the Risk Governance field and representatives of the stakeholders involved in the two case studies of MIDIR, has been performed. Participants of the discussion were:

The debate focused on expectations in dealing with risks and on the exchange of points of view among the involved speakers. They reported on actual needs and hindrance that can be found in the implementation of risk governance methodologies.

In particular, the following topics are discussed:

- Risk Governance: State of the art in different field, current developments and research needs;
- Quality- and Safety-Management and planning procedures (instruments, evaluation of performance);
- Lessons learnt in the MIDIR case-studies (with regard to the transferability of MIDIR elements);
- Public control of state action (role of politicians, non-governmental stakeholders and media);
- Recommendations for facilitating stakeholder involvement and risk dialogues.

Main statements were:

- Fundamental elements for a successful risk governance process are stakeholders involvement, proper regulation and policies;
- The more the risk is complex, the more in-depth stakeholder involvement has to be done;
- If the MIDIR risk governance methodology has been applied in the extreme risk settings of the case studies, then it should be applicable for every other risk settings too;
- Lessons learnt from the MIDIR project experience is the importance to have a methodology for the governance of any risk;
- Networking is a key activity to reach the cooperation and the active involvement of stakeholders in the risk governance process;
- An anticipatory risk management is necessary, allowing to define and to identify risks before the risky event occurs.

A final question was made to participants of round table, that is "Imagine a magic fairy influences the next budget negotiations of your organization and allocates 1 million euro for risk governance. Which measures (from the MIDIR-context and/or beyond MIDIR) would you give priority?"

The answers to this question can be summarized as follows:

- right legislation and policies;
- o engagement of human resources;
- external expert support;
- facilitation of communicative campaign;
- do not wait for a crises but to adopt precautionary principles in order to prevent incidents.

6 Conclusions

The MIDIR Final Event was a success both in terms of interest of participants in the MIDIR Approach as well as input on the concept to the Consortium. The results of the working groups and the roundtable discussions confirmed the implemented work in the project and the assumption that the MIDIR Approach is an innovative and interesting concept which should be promoted and developed further in the near future.
